McDONOUGH IS FLORIDA'S BEST BUDDY

Claire McDonough learned in kindergarten what many fail to grasp in a lifetime: Helping people is its own reward.

That revelation came into focus when, from her backyard, McDonough heard her cousin, Emily Granet, playing in a TopSoccer match at nearby Woodlands Park.

"We heard the music one day, and we decided to walk over, and we saw everybody playing, everybody having smiles on their faces," McDonough said. "I saw my cousin and I just jumped in and started doing the drills with her."

TOPSoccer is a program within the Soccer Association of Boca Raton (SABR) designed for Boca Raton's Special Needs community. The program is open to special needs players beginning at age four. Players don't age out of the program.


Volunteers, called "Buddies," are paired with players or a team to help on Saturdays with soccer drills and the games that follow.

Though the general rule is that a volunteer has to be in at least eighth grade, and most are in high school or older, McDonough officially became a Buddy as a fifth grader.

Her youth prompted TOPSoccer to pair her with higher functioning players.

"As she progressed, got older, and more mature, we gave her the hard kids," TOPSoccer Director Vic Nocera said. "She's been a great asset to our club. The kids love her."

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Gilbert's Glorious Gumbo

Forty years after Gordon Gilbert's vision became a reality, the Gumbo Limbo Nature Center still stands as one of the Greater Boca Raton Beach and Park District's most important accomplishments.

A high school environmental science teacher and a District Commissioner from 1978-2008, Gilbert began his push to preserve a natural hammock along the Intracoastal within the Shine Tract - most of which became Red Reef Park- shortly after the purchase finalized.

Gilbert spent the better part of a decade raising funds for his project. Many, including some of his fellow Commissioners who were more focused on developing Patch Reef Park, doubted the usefulness of a nature preserve and education center.


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Patch Pickleball Progress

Earlier this month construction crews began clearing the area near the Patch Reef Park Tennis Center for construction of 18 new covered pickleball courts. Invasive and unhealthy trees are being removed. Healthy indigenous trees are being moved to a newly created preserve area within the park. The courts are expected to be open to the public by the end of next year. In other pickleball news, the Patch Reef Tennis Center has expanded the number of pickleball courts available for Friday afternoon open play to 12. Patch Reef is also hosting a Labor Day pickleball tournament on Monday, Sept. 2, from 9

a.m.-11 a.m.



District's Stable Foundation

What's in a name? When it comes to the District, a greater mission. When founded in 1974 as the Greater Boca Raton Beach Tax District, the District's sole purpose was to help retire the debt Boca Raton incurred when purchasing the Shine Tract - which would become Red Reef Park and the Gumbo Limbo Nature Center. In the years that followed, the District purchased and developed Patch Reef and Sugar Sand parks, creating more green space and athletic opportunities for the Boca Raton community. In 1996 Palm Beach County legislators officially changed the District's name to "Greater Boca Raton Beach and Park District.'



Playground For All

District Commissioners selected Schiff Construction's bid to renovate the playground at Patch Reef Park. Early this year Commissioners voted to upgrade the Pirates Cove playground to make the playground more inclusive for children with special needs. Commissioners acted in response to the Ogman family's request to create a more accessible playground for their son, Jordan, and other families with special needs. Schiff is currently navigating the city's permitting process and ordering the new equipment. The new inclusive playground is expected to open in the summer of 2025.



50th September Free Rides
